Childline On The Web

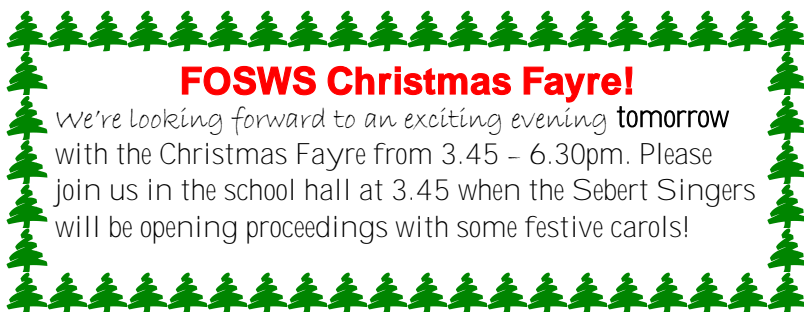

SCHOOL MONITORING

As a school we are regularly monitored by the Local Authority and by independent advisers. Our data and standards are closely scrutinised by members of our Governing Body and by Ofsted who check our data and undertake an annual risk assessment. We receive regular visits from a School Excellence Officer (SEO for short) who is employed by the Local Authority to hold senior leaders to account. She visits twice every half term and last week she spent time looking at data and analysing maths work across the school. On Friday 18th November the school was also monitored by an independent adviser (who also works as a lead Ofsted inspector). *She spent the day in school analysing school data and undertaking 'Learning Walks' with members of the Senior Leadership Team.* This involves observing the teaching and learning going on in school as well as looking at the work in pupils books. She was very impressed by what she saw and commented on the positive attitudes to learning, good behaviour across the school and she said that the school presents an attractive learning environment where parents are valued. She was pleased to see the new Accelerated Reader system in place for both boys and girls in years 3 to 6 and said that it was already having a very positive effect. *She commented that staff are 'always willing to go the extra mile' for all pupils.* She was also very impressed by our overall pupil attendance figures which currently stand at 98%, which is a figure well above the national average. We would like to thank parents for their support in promoting good behaviour and good attendance. We hope that the recent attendance level stickers you received in reading record books/homework diaries were helpful.
